
The Impact of Forensic Anthropology in Undergraduate Anthropology Programs

Undergraduate programs with forensic anthropology concentrations also have more anthropology majors

Forensic anthropologists are less likely to be hired at academic institutions, even for positions that emphasize candidates with backgrounds in forensic anthropology

Hiring practices of forensic anthropologists in academia Of these 69 positions, 34 individuals (49%) were hired with a background in forensic anthropology. From the 32 postings specifically emphasizing the desire for a forensic anthropologist, only 18 (56%) actually hired someone with a background in forensic anthropology. Frequently individuals specializing in bioarchaeology were hired instead.

Conclusions

These data support: (1) undergraduate anthropology students are interested in forensic anthropology and (2) academic anthropology programs are not interested in hiring forensic anthropologists, even for forensic anthropology specific positions. If forensic anthropology can be used to recruit anthropology majors and increase the overall tenets of anthropological thought in undergraduate programs, then forensic anthropology and forensic anthropologists should be a highly-regarded aspect of our discipline.
